Conservatives upend school board

fter an election where a four-vote margin allowed a conservative majority to take control of the Grosse Pointe School Board, the pace of meetings — and the pace of change — has

been overwhelming.

During a Jan. 19 special meeting called with only two days' notice, the new board voted 4-3 to effectively end a previously approved clinic that would have provided the community with free basic health care and mental health care at GP North High School.

The trustees voted this clinic down after nearly two hours of public comment. Most public comment consisted of community members as well as educational and health experts in support of the clinic.

When the trustees voted to halt the clinic, they effectively overturned a prior decision.

In addition, they acted with total disregard for the 25% of GP North students who do not have any form of health insurance. A handful of clinic detractors, who repeated a talking point of "let them go to urgent care," resembled that historic cry of "let them eat cake."

The board also vigorously discussed a proposal to retain separate legal

counsel. This is notable because even in our litigious age, school boards rarely hire their own attorneys.

New trustee Sean Cotton, owner of the Grosse Pointe News, compared in meeting times. While not in violation of the Open Meetings Act, it's clear they are moving in a direction that hampers public oversight and participation.

The new majority has voted against the planned basic health care and mental care clinic at Grosse Pointe North and vigorously discussed retaining separate legal counsel for the board with arguments refuted by experts . The GP Dems are planning an April 19 town hall at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial to discuss the board and best practices in board governance.


this situation to corporate boards that retain separate legal counsel. His argument has been refuted by experts who agree that school boards are already represented by a district's legal counsel, and there is no need for a separate firm to represent them.

The board also has established four committees with representatives from the community along with board members: Finance and Facilities, Policy and Contracts, Curriculum, and Community Engagement. A full list of committees and their members is on gpschools.org.


Since first meeting on Jan. 4, the board is developing a reputation for multiple and somewhat hastily called meetings, as well as a change It is likely other dramatic decisions by this board will happen between the time of writing this update and its distribution.

The GP Dems are planning an April 19 town hall at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial to discuss our school board and best practices in board governance. Experts in governance and former board members will share best practices and help our community process and understand some of the board's recent actions.



More than 1,000 Michigan State students and supporters joined a sit-in protest at the state Capitol in Lansing, a week after a gunman killed three students and injured five others on Feb. 13. As one student said at the protest: "We're a mass shooting generation. We have generational trauma of where we learned about the ABCs and then we learn about how to run from a gunman." We honor their strength and share in their sadness.
