Vote YES! on reproductive freedom, 2 other proposals

This year's general election ballot will have three very ■ significant proposals for voters to decide. Here's what you'll see on your ballot:

Proposal 1 – Term Limits and Financial Disclosure

This measure would apply a flat 12-year term limit to lawmakers' tenure and mandate financial disclosure rules for statewide candidates and elected officials.

The current tenure rule is a firm six years (three terms) in the state House, and eight years (two terms) in the state Senate. It would drop the maximum time state lawmakers can serve from 14 to 12 years, but allow them to stay their full tenure in one chamber of the legislature.

The financial disclosure rules would require that elected officials submit new information, such as descriptions of assets and liabilities, all sources of income, positions held outside of their elected office, gifts received from lobbyists and more.

How to vote: We recommend you vote YES on this ballot proposal.

Proposal 2 – Voting Rights

Approval of the Promote the Vote initiative would add several voting rights changes to the Michigan Constitution, including nine days of early voting and expanded access to absentee voting. It also would require military

and overseas ballots to be counted if postmarked by Election Day and require a ballot drop box for every 15,000 voters in a municipality, among other things. A grassroots initiative and extension of the 2018 Voters Not Politicians proposal, this effort gathered 669,000plus signatures. Learn more at promotethevotemi.com.

How to vote: We recommend you vote YES on this ballot proposal.

Proposal 3 -**Reproductive Freedom**

Known as the Reproductive Freedom for All initiative, this would restore and codify the right for women to have bodily autonomy and reproductive freedom in Michigan. It will invalidate Michigan's 1931 abortion ban and other existing regulations that restrict abortion access. This grassroots effort gathered a recordbreaking 735,000-plus valid voter signatures, energized by the U.S. Supreme Court decision in June that struck down Roe v. Wade and ended 49 years of federal protections for legal abortion access. After some legal battles and Republicans' best efforts to kill it, the Michigan Supreme Court ordered it to be on the ballot this November. Learn more at mireproductivefreedom.org.

How to vote: We recommend you vote YES on this ballot proposal.
