Make a plan to vote! Here's why it matters

Por those who tuned in to the Democratic National Convention in August, there was one phrase repeated over and over throughout the four nights: "Make a plan to vote!"

Even in a typical election during saner times, voting plans can be complicated. Finding time before or after work, coordinating schedules to make sure children get to school and activities and factoring in time to stand in line can be challenging.

But typical doesn't compare with the minefield facing us in 2020. Voters must weigh the risks of the coronavirus, the time it takes to receive and send mail-in ballots and the coordinated effort by the Trump administration to make voting harder.

Despite routinely voting by mail himself, Trump has repeatedly spread false information on how that works. He and his conservative allies on Fox News realize that the more people vote, the worse his chances for re-election are.

In May Trump appointed Republican fundraiser Louis DeJoy to run the United States Postal Service, even though he had no USPS experience. Since then he has worked to slow down mail delivery, and the USPS warned 46 states and Washington, D.C. that it might not be able to deliver mailed ballots in time.

Bipartisan political pressure has caused DeJoy to suspend some of his changes but concerns remain over his tactics to damage the integrity of the postal service.

These challenges make it all the more important to ensure our votes count. That is why leaders such as President Obama, Michelle Obama, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer and Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson are urging all Americans to make a plan.

Here are a few considerations for our voters in Detroit, the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods:

- 1. Track your ballot. To make sure you are registered to vote and see if your ballot has been received, go to this Michigan Secretary of State website: https://mvic.sos.state.mi.us/Voter/Index
- **2.** Be safe if you vote in person. Wear a mask, wash your hands and maintain social distancing. Also, double-check your polling location by calling your city hall or at mvic. sos.state.mi.us/Voter/Index/#yourclerk
- 3. Give yourself plenty of time to mail in your ballot. If you requested an absentee ballot, you should receive it by early October. If you mail the ballot by Oct. 20, it should arrive in time. But to be on the safe side, think about mailing it as soon as you fill it out. The state of Michigan recommends 71 cents worth of postage.
- 4. For even more peace of mind, return your ballot to your city hall in person or in a designated drop box. And not just any drop box: It is critical that you drop yours off in your city. Otherwise it won't be counted and



we need every vote counted.

The Harper Woods drop box is inside city hall and is accessible around the clock. Each of the Grosse Pointes has drop boxes in front of their respective city halls. There will be 50 drop boxes throughout Detroit. Michigandropbox.com, which will have a list, was not live by our press time but is expected to be in early October so keep checking.

The pandemic means a lot will be different about voting this year. Make a plan and vote early. America's future depends on it.

Paul Donahue left behind rich legacy

It's all Paul Donahue's fault I'm infected with the political bug. That was my first thought when I learned he passed away on Aug. 16. He was 86 and living with his wife, Sylvia, in North Carolina.

In the late '80s I was working with Sylvia and she told me about a Grosse Pointe Democratic Club meeting. I went and was amazed to find out you could fill a room with people who would *BOO!* when President Reagan was mentioned — in Grosse Pointe! It was a revelation. I found my home.

I came back for more and became a member and volunteer. After graduation, I sent a note saying I wanted to do more. It turned out that he had some ideas.

Paul put me on the executive board and a couple years later asked me to replace him as club president. He made it easy to learn the job. He and David Greenspan began taking me everywhere, introducing me to elected officials, party leaders and neighborhood groups. The two of them gave me an unparalleled education in politics and history.

Paul started his career as a teacher but ultimately went into politics. He was Michigan campaign director for Hubert Humphrey's 1968 and 1972 presidential campaigns. He was executive administrator on the congressional staffs of Lucien Nedzi and Dennis Hertel. It was while working for Congressman Hertel in 1987 that Paul revived the Grosse Pointe Democratic Club.

Retirement did not end his political life.

He became chair of the Henderson County Democratic Party when he and Sylvia moved to North Carolina.

Paul truly enjoyed people and believed in having a good time. Politics is serious, but he had fun. He loved playing practical jokes. I was a victim early in my term as president. At an executive board meeting considering a routine endorsement, I left the room for a moment, came back and called for the ayes. Dead silence. I assumed no one heard me and asked again. Still silence. When I asked for nays, everybody voted no; Paul had told them to. We all laughed — none harder than Paul.

Paul still inspires me. The best way to honor him is to do all we can to turn out the vote for Joe Biden, Gary Peters, Brenda Lawrence and the entire Democratic ticket in November.

Precinct delegate

The Aug. 4 primary completed a successful recruitment effort in which 154 candidates were elected, 11 by write-in, in the 110 precincts in State House Districts 1 and 2. That's 44 percent of the 350 allotted positions.

Grosse Pointe filled 27 percent of its positions; Harper Woods, 33 percent; Detroit, 36 percent; Grosse Pointe Woods, 62 percent; Grosse Pointe Shores, 66 percent; Grosse Pointe Park, 78 percent, and Grosse Pointe Farms, 89 percent.

New and re-elected delegates are working with the Action Committee to spread the word to all eligible voters that

this election is critical to America's future and that every vote matters.
All precinct delegates and Grosse
Pointe Democratic Club members are encouraged to sign up to work the polls in their city in November or to volunteer in Detroit, which has the greatest need. The Detroit enrollment site is: vote4detroit.net/pollaccess/


