GP Dems are standing strong like never before

t's been 10 months since the devastating election of Donald Trump, and for us it's been a time to resist, to speak out and, at times, to successfully halt the Republicans' assault on working people and the middle class.

I want to thank groups like We GP for their activism to organize like-minded people to raise awareness and change our government. Even

though the group is nonpartisan, we support their efforts because our causes coincide.

It's my hope that the Michigan Democratic Party also will support and partner with like-minded nonpartisan organizations. These groups allow people from different

backgrounds and political viewpoints to become involved, which is what we need to expand our voter base and community outreach.

Since election night, what have we learned and done to improve our ability to persuade voters and win elections? In my last article, I said the party has to re-establish trust with voters who didn't support Democrats in the last election but have in the past, and we must be able to handle the truth and not criticize or place blame. In short, we must listen and, most important, be able to see our weaknesses and fix them.

Unfortunately, Democrats are falling into the blame trap and we risk losing those voters again. With so much at stake in the 2018 and 2020 elections, such as redistricting, we must not let that happen.

So what is the Democratic Party doing to win back those voters? Not enough.

It's easy to criticize but that will only push those voters further away. We have to listen to

them and be open-minded enough to see all sides of an issue.

Plus, our party needs to stand strongly on issues, and all Democrats elected to public office must follow the platform. Voters must be able to rely on us at ALL levels to protect working people. As it was so painfully evident in the last election, working- and middle-class voters have lost trust in us.

To regain the trust of the public and nonaffiliated voters who decide elections, we must be able to produce and be relied on to protect their interests without compromise or delay. Actions must follow words.

Here is my proposed solution: The Michigan Democratic Party for 2018 should adopt and enforce a "compact for working people." It would be a straightforward economic platform for

Voters to fill vacant House seat

he recent winner of a contentious Democratic primary race for state House District 1, Tenisha Yancey is headed into the November general election as the candidate most likely to represent the heavily Democratic district in Lansing.

Yancey, a former prosecuting attorney and member of the Harper Woods school board, was one of 11 Democratic primary candidates to fill the seat vacated earlier this year when former State Rep. Brian Banks resigned as part of a plea agreement.

"I feel really proud that I was able to be victorious, considering the amount of people in the race," she said. "Humble as well, and very grateful for the constituents in this area that found me to be the best candidate."

On Nov. 7, when Michigan voters head to the polls for the general election, Yancey will run against Republican Mark Corcoran and Libertarian Gregory Creswell in her bid to represent District 1, which includes a portion of northeast Detroit, Grosse Pointe Woods, Grosse Pointe Shores and Harper Woods.

Yancey acknowledges her constituents have different priorities – from drug crimes to education to preserving the Great Lakes. "During the times I was knocking doors, I never heard anyone from Grosse Pointe or Harper Woods have a fear of dead bodies found in the homes next door to them or drugs," she said. "I don't know that the constituents who are faced with drug dealing on their street are as concerned with

water pollution and air pollution as they are in suburban areas because they have a more imminent danger and threat they face com-

ing out of their homes every day."

Yancey said that if elected to serve this diverse district, she will hold town halls accessible to everyone and focus on issues she

heard so much about during the primary.

In addition to crime and pollution, Yancey mentioned classroom sizes, insurance redlining and the pension tax as important to her constituents. She plans to push for no more than a 30-to-1 student-toteacher ratio.

"You can't keep cramming kids into a classroom and have mandatory reading laws and expect teachers to have the one-on-one attention some of the students may need who are not getting it at home," she said. "If classrooms are oversized and crowded, you also have behavioral issues that will interfere with goals that need to be met."

Yancey cites years of experiences as an attorney, public servant and single mother that will help her be effective in Lansing. "I want to work with whomever is there who has the same goals I have and who wants to keep fighting the good fight."

working people and the middle class that all Democratic elected officials, candidates and leaders must sign off on, agree to and, most importantly, follow. No deviations.

It would include pensions, health care, wages, middle-class tax reform, student loan reform, opposing the exportation of jobs to foreign countries, supporting public education and other economic and taxation positions.

If a Democratic candidate or elected official doesn't believe in the compact for working people, then perhaps the Democratic Party is not where that person fits.

If some feel uncomfortable about this, then it's time we make people feel uncomfortable if they can't support and follow positions for working people and the middle class. We have to take a hard line.

This pledge to the compact for working people would emphatically notify the public who we are, what we stand for and what we will do if we elect a Democratic governor and legislative majorities in 2018.

Continuing to run on what we are against is not working. We must show voters they can trust us. Otherwise, we risk more horrific defeats in the elections ahead.

n Aug. 17 the Michigan Board of Canvassers approved petition language that would change the state constitution to create an independent commission to redraw our congressional and state House and Senate districts.

A volunteer army mobilized immediately to gather the required 315,654 registered voter signatures in the allotted 180 days, to get the issue to voters on the 2018 ballot. In fewer than 30 days, the 6,500 activists got nearly 117,000 signatures, and the momentum builds daily.

Many Grosse Pointe Dems and precinct delegates are in the middle of the movement, but we need more. It is important and rewarding work to change the way our political representatives are chosen by ending gerrymandering, the process in which the party in power manipulates boundaries of the electoral constituency to dilute the voting strength of the other party.

The roots of the Women's March are impressive. It was the largest single-day protest in U.S. history. It not only inspired sister marches in Grosse Pointe and around the country but around the world. In all, 5 million people marched that weekend.
